## **Curriculum Rationale**

These are the principles that shape our intent, implementation and intended impact of our subject area on the wider Middlewich High School Curriculum. We believe that every pupil, regardless of ability or background, should expect the same consistently high-quality education in every lesson taught by every teacher across our Curriculum team.

Our Vision and Values for our Subject are:	Vision and Values:
	<ul> <li>For students to appreciate how an understanding of the past enriches and improves their understanding of the world we live in today, and how past events have played a part in shaping their lives.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>To develop enquiring minds and a curiosity about the world in which we live</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>To provide students with key skills for the future such as analytical thinking, critical evaluation of evidence and high level literacy skills.</li> </ul>
	• To develop cultural awareness and appreciation of difference and diversity across time, both in Britain and the wider world
	<ul> <li>To encourage students to evaluate and debate different views about the past in order to reach balanced, substantiated judgements</li> </ul>
Our rationale for teaching what we teach is as follows:	KS3:
	<ul> <li>To teach a breadth and depth of knowledge within a chronological framework (from the middle ages to the 20th century), so that students can make links within and across periods of History</li> </ul>
	• To understand how British politics, foreign policy, society and economy has affected, and been affected by, world events
	• To give students the opportunity to diversify their studies to consider, for example, the achievements of the medieval Islamic states and the importance of the Silk Roads.

	<ul> <li>To provide the contextual understanding and skills which students need as the foundation for GCSE History and beyond</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>KS4:</li> <li>To build on the historical understanding developed through KS3 to meet the demands of GCSE History</li> <li>To offer a breadth and depth of British and World History from the middle ages to the present day</li> <li>To enable students to see links and common themes through the topics we choose to study</li> <li>To prepare students for further historical study and to equip them with a range of transferable skills for the future</li> </ul>
The principles that shape our Key Stage Three Curriculum are:	<ul> <li>To give students the opportunity to study topics from a broad period of History (from the middle ages to the 20<sup>th</sup> century) set within a clear chronological framework.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>To encourage students to engage with academic debate by exposing them to a range of current historical scholarship</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>To develop student's high order historical thinking and grasp of first and second-order concepts to ensure positive outcomes at KS3+4.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>To develop students retrieval skills, schema and spaced practice by revisiting historical periods and events in Y9 (previously studied in y7 and 8), to consider different aspects, themes and significance, and so extend understanding</li> </ul>
The principles that shape our Key Stage Four Curriculum are:	<ul> <li>To provide an overview, breadth and depth of topics across time and place from Elizabethan British History to 20<sup>th</sup> century American History, the impact of the Cold War in Asia and the thematic study of Britain; health and the people from the middle ages to the present day</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>To prepare students for the future, equipping them with skills and knowledge that will increase their employability and foster a lifelong love of learning</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>To provide a wealth of opportunities for students to grapple with difficult and challenging concepts, historical, analytical and conceptual.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>To build on the contextual understanding students gain from their studies in the KS3 years, and the skills they developed.</li> </ul>
